# **REBOOTING THE UNIX SYSTEM**

Rebooting is a term which refers to the stopping and restarting of your computer system. Software Integrators advise clients to reboot their computer system at least once a month for optimum performance.

- Rebooting ensures efficient function response and processing speed time.
- Rebooting clears old and unnecessary processes.
- Rebooting decreases the chance of system crashes.

Rebooting allows the computer to run through a series of checks to test that all hardware components are in order.

## To shut down the system:

# MAKE SURE ALL USERS ARE LOGGED OFF THE SYSTEM

- Log into the system as '*root*' from the main console (you will need the root password for this).
- Type in the following command at the '#' prompt:

# shutdown -gØ -y <enter>

• The system will begin to shutdown. A message will prompt:

## \*\*\*\*Safe to Power Off\*\*\*\* or \*\*\*\*Press any Key To Reboot\*\*\*\*

• At this point it is safe to turn off the computer system, or press any key to reboot.

## To start up the system:

• Turn on the computer (if it has been turned off).

The system will begin with start up checks and you will then see a 'boot:' prompt.

- At this prompt press <enter> (on some systems you may not have to press <enter> at the boot prompt). You will be prompted to press <CONTROL D> to proceed with normal startup or enter the '*root*' password for system maintenance. At this point press <CONTROL D>.
- You will be prompted to enter the date and time.

There is a special format that you must follow. The format to enter is MMDDHHMMYY. Therefore, for the 8th Nov 2001 at 4:32pm, you would enter: 1108163201 <enter>

N.B.It is not necessary to change the date at this point.

With some newer systems where the time and date are stored in memory, you can press <enter> to keep the existing date and time.

The system will then come back up and a 'login' prompt will appear on screen.
